Hospitality—The 4-H Way

Remember back to some time as a young person, or even as an adult, walking into a room full of people where you didn't know anyone and just wanted to pretend you were invisible and stand against a wall. It wasn't a comfortable feeling, but after meeting other people you began to enjoy the activities associated with the group. One of the life skills that 4-H helps teach young people is the art of hospitality and making others feel welcome. Hospitality is making new guests as comfortable as possible, providing for their needs, and treating them as equals.

After thinking about your personal experiences in new environments, think about an eight year-old person that has learned about a fun and cool program called 4-H! They don't know anyone in 4-H, but they have seen articles in the paper talking about all the projects a young person can participate in such as food & nutrition, raising animals for the fair, photography, but also things such as wildlife, computers, and even bicycles. If this person and their parent walked into your 4-H club, how would they feel? Would they feel welcome? Would they be greeted by another 4-H member, perhaps an officer? Would a club advisor introduce themselves to the young person, to the parent? How would your club help them get to know everyone? Welcoming new 4-H members into our program is an important role of current 4-H members, parents, and volunteers. Using some of the tips below, we can help make sure new 4-H members feel welcome at our club meetings.

- Designate a greeter to meet new members when they arrive.
- Start with an ice-breaker to help people learn names.
- Ask the new member if they have any questions.
- Direct them to key leaders or Extension staff who can help them.
- Follow up with a phone call after the first meeting.

These are just a few of the suggestions for making our new 4-H members feel welcome as they join 4-H. Regardless of your plans for welcoming 4-H members, it is not a one month chore either. For some, becoming involved in 4-H can be overwhelming because of the number of projects and opportunities. Helping new 4-H families into the program is an ongoing opportunity for club officers, older 4-H members, and adult leaders to strengthen the club's membership and help young people know they are truly valued in the 4-H Program.

2017 Enrollment for MARKET LIVESTOCK PROJECTS

ALL Members are required to fill out a NEW 4-H/FFA Enrollment form, have all projects listed and all signatures in place and to the Extension office by 5:00 pm on Wednesday, April 14. Market livestock projects cannot be added after the DEADLINE of APRIL 14. ALL original signatures and forms must be turned in by 5:00 pm April 14, 2017. No faxes or emailed copies will be accepted for livestock projects.

Poultry Orders

All Poultry orders (market turkeys, chickens & ducks) must be ordered and paid for by April 14.

Ohio Pullorium Testing School

Two schools (May 2 & May 4) are held in Ohio for people ages 18 and older interested in becoming pullorum testers. The Ohio Poultry Association (official state agency, NPIP) and the Ohio Department of Agriculture are combining efforts to organize Pullorum-Fowl Typhoid plate agglutination tester training classes. You must be 18 years of age to become a certified tester. There is a charge of \$50 per student to offset program costs. There is an additional \$5 fee for first time participants. Your certification is valid for 5 years. Email adillinger@ohiopoultry.org for more info.

2017 Quality Assurance

We are planning Three (3) QA sessions for the 2017 fair season. Please remember that QA is mandatory for all youth (taking market livestock and lactating dairy cattle/goat projects) and one parent/guardian to attend in order to be eligible to participate in junior fair events, shows and sales at the fairs.

March 23 - Waterford High School, 7-9 pm April 19 - Warren High School, 7-9 pm May 15 - Washington Co. Career Center, 7-9 pm

TEST-OUT OPTION: Youth ages 12-14 and 15-18 may participate. The test will be offered after the QA sessions for any members who would like to participate. The test is 50 questions and you must pass with 70%. There are a limited number of tests available. If you are interested in taking the test please call the Extension Office to reserve a space after the QA session.

2017 SKILLATHONS

Project judging and skillathons allow youth to demonstrate and review what they have worked on and learned throughout their project year. The 4-H Advisory Committee has determined this piece of the 4-H project process is important and is part of the requirements for 4-H membership. The 4-H Advisory Committee, Livestock Committees and Senior Fair Boards have determined that skillathons meet the criteria for project judging.

ALL livestock (market, dairy, breeding, fancy, and/or horse) project members are *required* to participate in skillathons for *each* specie project they have enrolled in. Skillathons are *required* for all livestock and horse project participants in order to remain 4-H members in good standing and be eligible to exhibit, participate, show and/or sell their project animals at all three fairs. FFA youth taking hogs and/or Feeder calves should contact their FFA teacher for project requirements and eligibility. FFA Youth are *Required to participate in skillathons* for all animals sold at the Washington County Fair. To help this process and coordinate efforts of youth and volunteers *ALL* Skillathons will be offered:

Saturday August 5, 2017

8:30-3:00 - hogs—all day 8:30-11:30 - goats, lambs, rabbits (except pet rabbit); 1:00-3:00 - beef, dairy, poultry, horse (except horseless horse)

Make-up days: August 7 and 8 (9:00am—5:00pm) (limited space, calling to reserve an appointment is required--no make-up times will be available before August 7)

County Tag-in—Saturday, June 3

Required Tag-in for Market Lamb, Market Goat, Dairy Feeder Steer will be Saturday, June 3 from 8—11 am at the County Fairgrounds.

Born, Bred, & Raised Award Cards are due June 3

Note: Dairy Feeder exhibitors must turn in the Born, Bred, Raised card to verify the calf was purchased directly from a dairy farmer in Washington, Athens, Morgan, Monroe or Noble Counties. See Rules #18 and #25 in Jr Fair Guide for more specifics.

The blue born, bred, & raised card is available from the OSU Extension Office and 4-H Advisors.

Ohio 4-H Conference

The Ohio 4-H Conference is the largest gathering of 4-H volunteers in the United States. The conference welcomes nearly 1,500 teen and adult volunteers to participate each year. The Ohio 4-H Conference is designed to equip participants with resources. information, and skills to meet the ever-changing needs of youth. Fourteen youth and adults representing Washington County 4-H attended the conference on March 11 at the Columbus Convention Center.

The conference recognized Charlotte Wagner of Lowell for being a 70 year 4-H volunteer and Darlene Burke-Ogletree of Marietta is a 40 year volunteer. Wagner and Burke-Ogletree both serve as 4-H club advisors in their local communities. Charlotte Wagner joined a local 4-H club when she was 9 years old. The club that Charlotte joined was chartered in 1922 and was known as the Buckeye Canning Club. A few years later they changed the name to Lowell Girls 4-H Club. and then in the 1960's to Lowell Lively Lassies, and finally when boys joined the club the name changed once more to Lowell Lively Lassies and Lads. Darlene Burke-Ogletree is a 4-H alumni were she enjoyed 10 years as a 4-H member in the Oak Grove 4 Fold 4-H Club. She has focused her time on being a club organizational advisor, a member of the 4-H home economics committee and 4-H advisory committee.

Two local clubs were also recognized for their developing new and creative program as well as community service. The Washington County Interstate Exchange Club was recognized with the 2017 Innovator Award. The club travels and hosts members from other states to experience different cultures across the United States. The club members participate in many fundraisers and created a point system to help members track their fundraising. The club has traveled to Montana, Kansas, and Wisconsin and is looking forward to hosting Wisconsin this summer.

Members of the Oak Grove Explorers 4-H Club received the 2017 State Community Service Award for organizing the 5K Run/Walk for Camp Hervida. The club has raised more than \$7,752 for Camp Hervida since

organizing the event. In 2016, \$1549 was given to the Hervida 4-H Camp Board to purchase a new commercial refrigerator.

4-H Project Books

It's time to get your 4-H Project Books and get an early start on your project year. Most projects, including animal projects require members to purchase a new project book each year. Rule of thumb—new animal = new book. However, keep in mind the livestock resource handbooks are a one-time purchase that can be used as a reference year after year. Most books are now available at the Extension Office for purchase. We have some really neat 4-H projects you can explore on project central: http://projectcentral.ohio4h.org/

4-H Enrollment Process

- Enrollment forms are due April 14th by 5:00 pm
- Faxed/emailed and/or forms without ALL signatures in place will NOT be accepted.
- Enrollment forms also serve as the market livestock entry – so please double check projects!
- Market Goat vs Market Dairy Goat—project members need to indicate on enrollment form by including the fair name next to project. However, only one record book is needed for multiple animals.

Ohio 4-H Age Guidelines

- Cloverbud Members must be at least 5 years old and in Kindergarten as of January 1, 2017
- 4-H Members must be at least 8 years old and enrolled in 3rd grade as of January 1, 2017

How Do 4-H Cloverbuds Spell Team?

How do Cloverbuds spell team? Of course, they spell it the same way everyone else does! Here are some fun team builders for your Cloverbud clubs with just a few variations from the older club version.

- 1. Find a Cloverbud Activity Give each Cloverbud an activity card and ask them to fill it up with other Cloverbuds' signatures that match the feature/trait in each box. With Cloverbuds, play until everyone has his/her entire card filled so the emphasis is on talking and sharing the activity card. (*Find a Cloverbud* activity is available on the Cloverbud Connections website at http://www.ohio4h.org/volunteers/cloverbud-leaders/click-it-print-it-do-it-activity-pages.
- 2. Beach Ball Games- All kids love beach balls- no matter what their age. Here are a few beach ball games that Cloverbuds will love.
 - a. Ask all Cloverbuds to stand in a circle. You start by passing the ball to a Cloverbud member and saying your name. That member must then pass the ball to another Cloverbud and say his/her name. Continue until everyone in the group has had the ball and said their names. The last person then throws the ball back to you.
 - b. The second step is a little trickier. You pass the ball to a Cloverbud, but this time, say that person's name. Again, do this until all Cloverbuds have had the ball. The important thing to tell the group is that they need to remember who they got the ball from and who they threw it to so they can establish a pattern. Ask the Cloverbuds if they know what a "pattern" is. Define it for them and ask if they are familiar with the word.
 - c. After you have established this pattern, try to "group juggle." Throw the ball in the same pattern as before and try to make it go around the circle a little faster each time- always catching from and throwing to the same people as before. If your group can handle it, add another beach ball so your group will be "juggling" two balls!
- 3. Build a Structure. Building is a great team builder because it causes members to think, talk and share ideas with each other. In this game, you will need to bring in some fun materials and ask the Cloverbuds to build a structure- perhaps a house that one of them can actually sit in when it is finished. If you have more than four members, break your group into smaller groups of three or four. Since we do not want this to become competitive, bring different materials for each group. When the time is up, each small group can show their structure to the whole group and tell about how they built it. Some ideas for structures: newspaper and duct tape, pool noodles and duct tape, or spaghetti and marshmallows (if you have older Cloverbud members who can handle the motor skills required.)
- 4. Play School Bus. Tape a line of duct tape down the middle of the room. Choose a bus driver. Driver shouts out pairs of stops, for example, cats or dogs. Participants who like cats must sit on right side of bus (tape) and those who like dogs must sit on left side of bus. Go through several stops including: Loud/quiet; Save/spend; Hamburger/salad; Fruit/vegetable; Fast food/home cooked; vanilla/chocolate. This activity is a great team builder because it teaches group members that they probably have something in common with almost everyone.



5. This may be my favorite Cloverbud team builder. Cook together! Or, at least do something with food! Ask all Cloverbuds to bring in an ingredient for whatever you choose to make. Some great ideas: soup, sundaes, or trail mix. Ask all the Cloverbuds to bring their ingredient to the table. (Bring a few ingredients yourself in case someone forgets to bring something.) Put everything together and serve your creation. A food creation is like a group of Cloverbuds. Everyone brings something unique, but when you put it all together, it is great!
