Exhibitors are responsible to read and comply with all rules from ODA, Senior Fair Boards and Livestock Committees

<u>Project Book:</u> #150DM Market Duck for 1st year members, or Washington County Livestock Record Book for 2nd year members and beyond. (required for Skillathon), FFA exhibitors see your advisor for requirements. **ALL project books must be in print form.**

Enrollment Form Due: April 15th – Must be ordered and paid for by this date April 15 – completed enrollments turned in between April 16 and May 1 will be accepted with a \$10 late fee. Poultry order is not guaranteed and is pending availability after April 16. After May 1 NO LATE ENROLLMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED

<u>Project Animal Requirements</u>: *Orders must be placed and paid for by April 15

*Maximum of 6 ducks per exhibitor can be ordered

*Pens will consist of 2 ducks

*Only drakes ordered, exhibitors not penalized for hens sent

*Possession: From time of pick-up (mid – July)
*Fair weight limits: Min. 4.5# NO maximum weight

Pre-Fair Tag-In: NONE - exhibitors will be notified for pick-up of ducks

Quality Assurance: Exhibitor and one parent/guardian **must** attend one of the sessions offered in

Washington County or any other Ohio County. Test-out options are available for older youth.

Skillathon: Skillathon is **required** for exhibitor to be eligible to show and/or sell at the fair

What happens at the Fair?

- Check in Wednesday before fair 4:00 pm 8:00 pm on Wednesday in the poultry barn see schedule in Jr Fair Guide (completed DUNF must be presented to committee before weighing in)
- Buyer Thank you posters make a Thank You poster to thank previous buyer. Hang it in the barn. See Jr Fair Guide for details and size
- Classes To be eligible to SELL, exhibitor *must do both* Showmanship and Market Classes.
- Showmanship Thursday, 5:30 pm (determined by age, Seniors' first)
- Market Classes Friday, 9am
- What is the Premier Exhibitor Award? High scoring exhibitor from skillathon (100 points), showmanship (100 points) & market class placing (50 points)
- Sale Saturday, 5:00 pm Show Barn (Buyers Reception 4:00 pm)

What happens after the Sale?

- Thank/contact buyers thank buyers by note, call or in person
- Sale Checks checks are mailed directly to the exhibitors after payment from buyers has been made. If you have questions about your checks contact a 4-H Livestock Committee member.

Market Poultry Basics

What to look for and do the day birds arrive:

Check beaks - they are trimmed before shipping if too short they will have trouble eating

Legs and toes should be straight with no deformities

Birds should be alert and active

Be sure to bring water with you. Birds are shipped soon after they are born.

When you bring them home:

Add electrolytes to water. (can be found at any feed store)

Teach birds to drink by gently dipping their beaks in water source

Feeding the proper type of feed at the correct age is important:

- Turkeys starter mash
- Chickens broiler starter ration
- Ducks starter mash for first four weeks (22 24% protein), then switch to 20% protein finisher - do not use medicated feeds

Do not use stale, spoiled or moldy feed

Make sure birds have plenty of fresh feed and water at all times

Facilities for healthy growth:

Birds need to be kept warm and dry

Ventilation and sanitation are very important

Room to move and exercise must be available

Protection from weather, disease and predators is necessary

As they grow:

Facility area needs to grow with growing birds

Ventilation and sanitation should be top priorities

Some good bedding choices are: wood shavings, ground corn cobs or rice hulls and straw

Going to the fair:

Review project books to help you select birds for the fair

Review the Junior Fair Activities Guide for rules, dates, times and locations of all fair events

Make sure your birds are clean for the fair and throughout the fair

Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their birds throughout the day each day of the fair.
